### **JUDITH PILKINGTON'S STUFFED FIGS**



#### **Ingredients - serves four**

2 figs per person

Soft, creamy goats cheese – as much as you like/can pile on each fig

1 slice of Palma ham per fig

Handful of walnut pieces

Runny honey or maple syrup

Rocket

This makes a very easy starter and is delicious – especially at this time of year when figs are ripening on the trees. Cut the stems off the figs and ensure they can stand upright by thinly slicing the bottom if necessary. I have peeled large figs if the skin is very tough but there's usually no need to do this. Next, slice the figs in a cross from the top. Cut deep but not all the way down. Gently pull out the quarters so you fill with goats cheese. Push in some walnut pieces, too. Wrap a slice of the ham around each fig – you can use a cocktail stick to hold in place if necessary. Stand them in a shallow Pyrex (or similar) dish. Heat the oven to 200C. Cook for five minutes or so – until the cheese is slightly runny. Arrange on a plate and drizzle with honey or syrup and scatter with walnut pieces. Serve with rocket.



## DAVID HARROP'S COUNTRY DIARY

Since I last wrote the weather has been exceptionally hot with hardly any rainfall. This has affected the birds and animals during the breeding season. Lately on some wild fruit bushes, particularly elderberries, the berries haven't matured. So no food for birds and no wine making for me! Wild fires have also been a threat in our locality but fortunately we've been lucky here. However, I have been sorry to hear about the several wildlife reserves and regions around the country that haven't been so fortunate. Now we've had some heavy rain and the drought is over it is a big relief.

We have now come to the end of the nesting season and many of our garden visitors will be migrating back south to warmer (?) climates for the winter. One thing I have noticed is how busy my three birdbaths have been during the drought with all sorts – tits, finches, blackbirds, magpies, pigeons and doves to name some of the regulars. It's been fun to see them drinking and splashing about enjoying themselves. I have been busy topping them up daily and keeping them clean. I would recommend all gardens have a fresh, safe water source for wildlife. Rabbits have long had a warren in my garden and use a stone water trough at the lawn edge when they are not digging holes in it!

It's been important to provide bird food during the summer, particularly following the warning about birds transmitting a fatal disease by proximity contact. I have continued to put out suitable food scraps but making sure to scatter them randomly on the lawn in different places. My bird tables have been cleaned and sterilised ready for late autumn provided I hear from the RSPB that it is safe to use them again. During the hot summer I managed to maintain a variety of potted flowering plants on my patio and also lilac and other flowering shrubs in the borders. These have been welcome sites for bees; insects and butterflies.

I also have a number of sites for solitary bees, which are used annually and interesting to watch. However, I put up a new bee/insect house this year but a greater spotted woodpecker decided that it would help itself and just pulled out all the hollow bamboo canes to get at the larvae inside them. I've now moved it to a more protected site and hope the bird has given up trying. Autumn is here now so let's hope our local weather returns to normal.
